



# Master's Direct Entry into Nursing Practice (MDE) Program



Launch your **nursing career** with your master's in just **16 months**

The University of Rochester School of Nursing offers an accelerated master's-level nursing degree for non-nursing college graduates, providing another route to RN licensure. The program offers an accelerated pathway for non-nursing college graduates to earn a Master of Science in Nursing degree.

The curriculum is aligned with the **American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) Essentials** and includes 690 clinical hours across key settings such as medical-surgical, pediatrics, obstetrics/gynecology, and psychiatric/mental health. Coursework emphasizes foundational nursing education, evidence-based practice, quality and safety, leadership, and population health. Upon completion of the program, students will earn a Master of Science degree in Nursing and be eligible to sit for the **NCLEX-RN exam**.

- Official transcripts from all schools attended
- Current resume or CV
- TOEFL, IELTS, or DET scores for international applicants who are non-native English speakers
- As part of your application, you must also answer several questions (each with a 150-word limit)
